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German Canadian 3C - history

THE BEGINNING

In 1934, one year after the founding of the German Canadian Club, a group of young sport minded club members decided to form a soccer team. Two of these men, who were also founding members of the German Canadian Club, were Rudi Haehnel and Otto Mever. During the first year of operation, a series of exhibition games were played against German Canadian teams from the Windsor, Kitchener and Toronto areas. In 1935 the German Canadian FC entered a team in the recently formed London and District Soccer Association. This league consisted of six teams, CNR, London Hosiery, London Winery, Young Liberals, St. Thomas and the German Canadians. Home games were played both at C.N.R.A. Park on Egerton Street and Chelsea Green Park on Adelaide Street. In those early years the German Canadians struggled and did not win a single league game in the first two years of competition. The German Canadian FC struggled through many years of turmoil and worked hard to maintain their identity but for years was unable to field a contender. Very slowly in the late 1940's, with the influx of many new German immigrants the Germans Canadian FC began rebuilding their soccer program.

In 1952 the German Canadian Club purchased the site at 1 Cove Road on which the club house now stands. That same year, Cove Road Field was built and the GCFC organizers started recruiting talented players to field a strong team in the local League. The hard work by these dedicated coaches and players was promising and the GCFC became more competitive. After the 1956 season due to internal strife most of the German Canadian FC players defected to the newly formed St. Thomas German Canadian Club. With this mass exodus there remained only four veterans to rebuild the soccer team, Carl Zwick, Bert Vernaleken, Jack Bratscher and Hermann Belle. During the winter of 1956-57 Gerhard Czuprina joined the organization and became President (1958-60), secretary and also coached the "A" team. Paul Tratnik was the treasurer. These two men, with the help of those previously mentioned began recruiting many young talented players, enabling the GCFC in later years to become champions and cup winners many times over.

In the interim goalies such as Kurt Teutscher and Edgar Gripp stood between "the pipes". The best standing the GCFC could achieve was a 4th place finish. In 1961 all the hard work came to fruition. Kurt Teutscher became coach and Manager; Julius Kaponya became trainer using professional training techniques to develop the GCFC teams into formidable contenders. In addition the GCFC recruited a young 18 year old goalie from Clarke Rd. High School, Art Kussner. With the inclusion of additional young talented players, Jack Toxepeus, Gunter Klaus, Wolfgang Schroeter, "Seppi" Daiscak, Dario Cucinelli, Henk Koenraads and Michael Lutsch the GCFC began to reap the benefits. The First Division team won the League Championship in 1961, 62 and 63! They also won the International Cup three times between 1960 -1965. In 1962 the team also won the coveted City (League) Cup!

Cochrane fired the ball into the hands of goalkeeper Heinz Feth. Feth was outstanding for the Germans but was a victim of the weather on Hogg's goal. Hogg kicked a high, curving shot and Feth came in front of the goal ta catch it. The wind caught the ball and it went over Feth's hands into the open corner.

Scotland's goalkeeper, Dan Neil, stopped Schroeter's shot in the 35th minute of the first half, but let the ball fall across the goal line.

In 1963 the German Canadian FC formed a second team which captured the Second Division Championship in only its second year of operation. In 1965 the first team won the City Cup again! The following year, 1966 the second team had its finest season, capturing all the Second Division honours: Division 2 Championship, the Sinosic Cup and the Schaeffer Cup. In addition the GCFC won the International Cup 3 times between 1961 and 1966. In 1968 the GCFC started a youth program. A Bantam and Pee-Wee team were entered into the London and District Minor Soccer Association.

As the success of the GCFC grew another opportunity arose. Around 1966 numerous top flight West German Amateur teams began touring Canada and the United State looking for opponents to play during their sports vacations. The GCFC had numerous opportunities to host these games and played against such West German teams as TV Heilbronn, SV Plattling (2x), ESV Ingolstadt-Ringsee, Fvgg Weingarten, SV 1911 Traisa, FC Hertha 03 Berlin, Polizei SV Bremen and Düsseldorf SV. These games resulted in London, Ontario being considered a major stopping point for other touring teams through the coming years.


G-C to Play West Berlin Soccer Team

1969 was a monumental year. The GCFC was a thriving organization and the aspirations of the FC were coming to realization. At this time, Horst Ammonn (President GCFC), Max Gauss (Vice-President GCFC) and Herbert Dinkel (President GCC) were the driving force behind the German Canadian Club being awarded a franchise in the semi-professional National Soccer League. Most of the players on the NSL team were recruited from the successful GCFC amateur teams and this action severely depleted the amateur ranks. To comply with the NSL standards the German Canadian Club financed the revision to the soccer field changing its east/west direction to north/south and installed flood lights. Thus Cove Road Field became the first soccer field in London to have the highest standard in field quality. The NSL team had enormous growing pains and competition at this level took its toll on all NSL players and any players that were used from the amateur ranks.


The West Berliners regained their poise and sustained pressure in the next 20 minutes eventually led to their goal.

London All-Stars to meet top Bavarian team July 29

German Canadians of the London and District Soccer Association found they had taken on a bit more than they could handle when they scheduled an exhibition game with a touring West German team, TG Heilbronn Wuerttemberg last May.

The German club, however, which was soundly drubbed 6-0 by the Wuerttemberg First Division team, didn't lose its interest in providing London soccer fans with a chance of seeing good European teams

play against local competition.

The L&D all-stars have come to their aid and will meet Ingolstadt of the Bavarian First Division amateur league Thursday, July 29 at the German club's Cove Road Field. Game time is 6:45

Ingolstadt is bringing a 25man contingent, including 17 players, for a seven-game tour which will include games in Windsor July 21, Cleveland July 23 and Buffalo July 29.

The club, Eisenbahner-Sportverein (Railroad-Sportsclub) has a solid history in German soccer dating back to 1919. It won the First Amateur championship of Bavaria in 1962 and was promoted to the South German Second Division professional league. It finished in second place and was promoted to the First Division, one rank below the Federal League. Ingolstadt was demoted to the new Bavaria League last year and finished in second place this spring, just missing promotion again.

Ingolstadt, located on the Danube mid-way between Nuremberg and Munich, has played against stiff opposition this year and has come off with some commendable exhibition results. They included a 2-2 tie with Bayern Munich, European Cup champions and a respectable 4-2 loss to 1860 Munich, 1966 Federal League champions. Ingolstadt also beat the Bavaria all-stars 3-2 while losing 3-2 to STV Horst Emscher, 1967 West German amateur champions.

The club has two veterans, 30 and 31 and four players under 20 with the remainder in their early 20's with an average age of just over 23.

German eleven seeks NSL entry

London's German Canadians, a power in the London and District Soccer Association First Division for eight years, will make formal application to enter the semi-professional National Soccer League this season.

The German team received unanimous support at a club general meeting Sunday to proceed with the application and to make the necessary changes to their Cove Road playing field to bring it up to NSL standards.

It was estimated that \$15,000 would have to be spent, approximately two-thirds of it on lighting to allow for night games. League initiation fee is \$1,500 and other expenditures would be required to change the field from an east-west to a north-south position. Additional fencing and some seating would also be required.

The Germans are one of three London teams which have made inquiries into the league for the coming season. Marconi-Italia and Greek Olympians have also requested information.

The National Soccer League is one of the older continuously-run soccer leagues in North America, having started in 1927.

It operated with 10 teams last year and besides the London interest, a Guelph team and five Toronto teams have sought information regarding entry. The league would eventually like to expand to a two-division, 20-team setup. It is currently operating a junior league for players 18 years and under.

Among the teams last year were Windsor Teutonia, Sudbury Italia, Kitchener-Waterloo Kickers and Hamilton Portuguese plus six Toronto teams—Hellas, Ukrania, Croatia, Hungaria, White Eagles (Serbians) and Olympia (Germans). Definite interest has been shown by Toronto Celtic, Portuguese and St. Andrews. The teams would play a

home-and-home schedule with the top four clubs making the playoffs.

Formal applications are expected to be taken before the end of January and approved at the NSL's annual general meeting in February.

The German Canadians are currently holding indoor practices every Thursday at the Cove Road club from 8 p.m.-10 p.m. under trainer Wolfgang Mueller.

Club president Horst Ammonn stressed Sunday night that "positions are all open" for the coming year. The Germans, who finished in second place in the First Division behind Marconi, will continue to field a First Division team for the coming year if they are accepted into the NSL. But they will probably drop their Second Division "B" team.

Besides Ammonn, Max Gauss will operate as club vice-president, Arthur Schindel as treasurer, Walter Huber recording secretary and Paul Tratnik as team secretary. Gunther Forster and Eric Schaefer are team directors. The club expects to name a coach and manager when its status with the NSL is known.

German Canadians, who have made an application for entry in the semi-professional National Soccer League, named Max Gauss as team manager Thursday night.

Gauss, who also serves as team vice-president, will assume the added post immediately. He will be responsible for acquiring players and recruiting a coach. The Germans are currently holding workouts every Thursday from 8-10 p.m. at the Cove Road clubhouse.

The club expects its application to be approved at a general meeting of the NSL Feb. 8 in Toronto.

London German Canadians' application to the National Soccer League was accepted at the league's annual general meeting at Toronto Saturday night.

The London club received the necessary unanimous approval of eight voting teams —each team has veto power and will join nine of last year's teams and another two new entries to form a 12-team, semi-professional league.

A team from Montreal lost out in a bid for membership when one club refused it entry but Horst Ammonn, president of the local entry said that he thought the Montreal application may be reconsidered in the future. Another club from Hamilton has ownership problems and if settled, along with Montreal, could mean a 14-team league.

Teams returning from last year include six from Toronto—Croatia, Hellas, Olympia Harmonie, Hungarians, Serbia White Eagles and Ukrania. Sudbury Italia, Hamilton Portuguese and Kitchener-Waterloo Kickers are the other returning teams. Toronto Italia and Toronto Portuguese Canadians are the other two new teams admitted along with London.

Windsor Teutonia, a member for the past several years, was not at the meeting and Ammonn said that it was understood that the Windsor team wanted to sit out a year.

"I'm glad we're in and that the waiting is all over," said Ammonn, who added that the London delegation had to cool its heels for over four hours while the NSL discussed earlier business.

"There will be another meeting within 10 days to set the schedule . . we will play home-and-home games with all our home games Saturday nights, probably starting at eight o'clock," added Ammonn.

The German club, which had to pay a \$1,500 initiation fee, is also planning to spend 10 times that amount in renovations to their Cove Road Field, which will include lighting for night games plus playing field, locker room and seating improvements.

"The P.U.C. will look over the situation this week regarding the lights," said Ammonn, as soon as it is possible we will start breaking ground and get things moving outside."

Meanwhile the German club is holding indoor workouts at their Cove Road clubhouse Thursday nights from 8-9 o'clock and Ammonn says that any interested players are welcome to try out . . . the club also has teams entered in the London and District Soc-



G-C's, Eagles play to 3-3 tie

German Canadians are not going to set the National Soccer League on fire in this their initial year in the semi-professional league.

But considering the results of their first three games the London entry isn't going to be one of the league doormats either.

The Germans played to a 3-3 tie with Toronto White Eagles at Cove Road Field Saturday night, the team's home opener, before 550 satisfied spectators.

And after three games they have tied two and lost one. But the opposition has proved to be the cream of the crop, so far, in the 14-team NSL.

Saturday night the Germans dominated the game for the first 25 minutes as they took a 2-0 lead on goals by Charlie Papp and Carlo Iszakovits. White Eagles' team captain and inside left Joe Ognjauac got one back seven minutes before the end of the half but the Germans went ahead 3-1 after three minutes of the second half when an Eagle fullback, Peter Waingerl, scored an own goal, putting the ball into his own net.

The Toronto team came right back with Carlo Martisek scoring a minute later then he added the equalizer in the 22nd minute. The Eagles put on a great deal of pressure for the last 25 minutes of play but the clutch goaltending of Charlie Bouwman helped save the tie for the Germans.

The London team showed the effects of playing its third game since Monday night when it beat a touring West German team from Dusseldorf, 5-0 in an exhibition.

While the Germans' team play and offence was much improved in the first half, the club, as a whole, slowed down in the final 45 minutes.

Left winger Kelvin Harrison missed a total of four good chances to score for the Germans, the best one coming in the fifth minute of play when he had a breakaway and couldn't get control of the ball. In the 40th minute he also had a clear break on Eagle goalie Mike Delibasich but managed

only a weak shot from 15-yards out.

Papp scored a picture goal in the 14th minute when the Germans broke in with a three-on-two situation. When the two Eagle defenders closed in on Papp coming up the centre he rifled an 18-yard shot into the left-hand side of the net.

Dan Tomic batted the ball down in the Eagle penalty area six minutes later when the Germans were threatening and on the penalty Iszakovits put a hard shot to Delibasich's right side to give London a 2-0 lead.

Ognjauac almost waited too long when he got the ball 20 yards out and with Bouwman sprawled on the ground on the left side of the net after making a diving block on a centring attempt by the Eagles. Bouwman returned to the centre on the goal then the Eagle captain, who weighs just over 200 pounds, boomed a shot back into the left-hand corner.

Vlada Stojkov, who played the second half in the Eagle goal, jumped in vain as his teammate attempted to clear the ball back to him and arced it over his head into the goal to put the Germans in front 3-1.

But the German countered that mistake within a minute

when Papp, attempting to do the same thing, clear the ball back to Bouwman, found his pass intercepted by Martisek eight yards out and the Eagle forward rifled a shot into the right-hand corner of the goal.

Bouwman partly blamed himself for the third Eagle goal although he could hardly be faulted on it.

A German defender bounced a clearing shot high into the air, just six yards in front of the goal mouth and into a group of four Eagle players. Ognjanac headed the ball to Zizi Stojcevic who in turn headed it to Martisek and he again used his head to put the ball past a bewildered Bouwman.

"I should have come out and punched the ball out of play," said Bouwman. "But there were too many players and I might have lost it ... maybe I had too much time to think about it ... anyway the ball went about three different directions when it came down. It was a nice goal, they deserved it."

The German team meets Toronto Croatia this Saturday night at Cove Road in its next game then faces Hamilton Homer at Hamilton's HAAA Grounds the next afternoon. Croatia, along with Sudbury, is also in second spot in the league.

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

Germans blank Italia, behind Puskas

Stan Puskas is not just a goaltender, he's an entertainer as well.

Saturday night the German Canadian n e t m i n d e r performed to perfection as the London team scored a 2-0 victory over Toronto Italia in a National Soccer League game at Cove Road Field.

It was the first victory after three ties and two losses for the Germans while Italia suffered its fourth loss against three victories and a tie.

Second-half goals by Carlo Iszakovits and Charlie Papp gave the Germans the margin of victory but it was all Puskas, especially in the late stages of the first half when he broke up five "sure" scoring opportunities by the Toronto club.

He did it with a grace and style that went beyond mere

athletic prowess and touched on the theatrical. He made his job look like a piece of artwork.

And the audience of well over 600 persons (558 paid) showed their approval, even though there were a number of obvious Italia fans.

They cheered Puskas when he made his diving stops, curling himself up into the fetal position to give the ball maximum protection cupped between his arms and stomach.

They laughed with him too as he performed, especially at one point when Italia centreforward Mario Barone broke in on goal but was called on the offside. Puskas was walking away in the other direction almost before referee Joe Agnew blew his whistle.

And they also gave him a standing ovation, something almost unheard of in local soccer circles, when he hurled himself fearlessly at two Toronto players breaking in alone on him in the second half, coming up with the ball.

Puskas doesn't confine his remarkable abilities to tending a goal on a soccer field.

"I like any game with a ball," he said with a boyish grin after the game.

He also enjoys basketball, volleyball, table tennis and that Canadian game played with a stick and a ball flattened at two ends . . . 'hockey . . . which he played in his native Czechoslovakia.

Saturday it was a soccer ball which kept him busy as he held Italia off the scoresheet for only the third time in eight games.

Neither team mounted much of an attack in the first 20 minutes of play but Puskas was right on his toes as he stopped a hard drive by Barone in the 23rd minute.

Five minutes later playingcoach Anders Yrfelt came as close as Italia was going to get when he rocketted a 25yard shot off the inside of the German crossbar.

Yrfelt, who leads the NSL in scoring with six goals, came up from his halfback spot to take the ball after a nice passing combination from right winger Ralph McPate to Barone and back to Yrfelt. Puskas had no chance but Yrfelt was a fraction too high.

Italia had another great chance in the 35th minute when Yrfelt and McPate broke in alone on the goal but German fullback Hank Koenraads broke it up with a good ball tackle.

Then in the next four minutes Puskas made a great stop on Barone, stopped Barone and inside forward Mario Cim a d a m o r e at point-blank range just 13 yards in front of the goal, then Cimadamore twice more from the same distance with Barone putting the ball over a prostrate Puskas and watched with utter frustration as the ball also sailed over the crossbar.

Iszakovits caught the Italia defence off guard in the fifth minute of the second half when he took a long pass from halfback Don Napier and broke in alone on Toronto goalie Mario Pretotto, beating him with a 12-yarder. Papp, who had a clean breakaway in the 33rd minute, only to be stopped nine yards out by Pretotto, got almost an identical opportunity with two minutes left in the game.



Andy Marsh Gives Marconi 2-2 Tie

Andy Marsh, scoring his second penalty goal of the game, and with time running out, gave Marconi-Italia a 2-2 tie with German Canadian "A" at Cove Road Field Saturday. The contest was to decide the London and District Soccer Association early-season favorite in the First Division race.

Marsh, an ex-Gaelic football player from Ireland, drilled both of his shots into the lower left hand corner of the German goal, for his fifth and sixth goals in two league games.

His first goal tied the game at 1-1 after 15 minutes of play in the second half, cancelling a first-half goal scored by German inside right Pete Barker in the 33rd minute of play.

The circumstances surrounding the final two goals could well have been written for a Hollywood script.

German inside left Dario Cuccinelli was awarded a penalty kick after a Marconi player handed the ball with what appeared a minute left to play. He beat goaltender Charlie Bouwman with the same shot as Marsh had used earlier on German goal Heinz Feth.

Referee Ken Smith, however, allowed play to continue another three minutes after regulation time, to make up for time lost through injuries.

It was enough to allow Marconi to work into a scoring position then Cuccinelli inadvertently handed the ball in front of the German goal and the Italians were awarded their second penalty shot. Marsh made no mistake about it again as time ran out in the game.

Both clubs were evenly matched in the first half and Bouwman played an outstanding second half as the Germans held an edge in play. Smith also called an excellent game between the two hotly competitive teams.



THE 1970s

1970 brought growth again to the GCFC. The youth program was vibrant and warranted additional teams to be entered in the local League. Mosquito and Junior B teams were entered. The NSL team was getting stronger and aggressive recruitment resulted in the NSL team fielding a strong competitor in the 1971 and 1972 NSL campaigns.

In 1971 an Atom aged team was entered in the Minor League resulting in the GCFC having the largest youth program in the City of London. Depletion of the ranks of our London & District men's league 'A' team eventually resulted in the team being relegated to the Second Division, for the first time in its history. Ironically, that same year, the 'A' team finally captured the Cresswell Cup which had eluded them throughout the sixties.

With a very successful Second Division team and the depletion of the 'A' team, the GCFC decided to disband the 'A' team. In its place an Under-23 team was formed and entered into the Ontario Intermediate Soccer League in 1972. That year proved to be very successful for our Soccer Club. The 'B' Team won the Second Division Championship and was promoted into the First Division. The U-23 team captured all the honours in their league; the pre-season League tournament, the League Championship and the League Cup! With the success of the U23 the GCFC was looking to the future at being able to provide quality players to the NSL team and to replenish the existing amateur teams program. These dreams were shattered when the Ontario Intermediate Soccer League ceased operations. 1972 produced the strongest NSL team and many exciting games were watched at Cove Rd field with crowds ranging from 500-1500 spectators. As 1972 came to a close the GCFC debt load could not be reduced. Not being able to find financial backing to continue the NSL program resulted in the GCFC relinquishing the franchise to the present London City SC.

With the dissolution of the Ontario Intermediate SL, the transfer of the NSL franchise and the promotion of the 'B' team back to Division 1 a new 'A' team was formed with the amalgamation of various players from the NSL, Under-23 and Second Division teams. The remainder of the players formed a new 'B' team and entered into the Third Division.

Germans beat touring Darmstadt-Trasia 3-2

London German Canadians, with a two-week layoff between National Soccer League dates, came up with what would have to be considered an ideal practice session Tuesday night.

The Germans booked an exhibition game with a touring West German First Amateur Soccer team—SV 1911 Darmstadt-Traisa—and not only had a chance to look at some players waiting in the wings, but also won the game, 3-2 before

426 persons.

A first-half penalty goal by Heinz Brueninghaus and second-half goals by Carlos Iszakovits and Milan Behavka gave London the margin of victory.

Right winger Hans Lehr scored both goals for Traisa, both coming in the second half as London substituted freely in the final 45 minutes.

It was the second loss in four games for Traisa on its North American tour. It had lost 4-2 in an opening game to a Newark. N.J., team then won 4-1 and 4-0 over teams from New York City and Trenton, N.J. Traisa plays again Thursday night against Sarnia Germans at Sarnia's Norm Perry Park starting at 6:30 and winds up its six game tour Sunday against an Elizabeth, N.J. team.

The London Germans will be looking for their second victory against one loss and two ties in the semi-professional NSL Friday night when they meet Toronto Hungaria at Cove Road Field. Game time is 8:30.

The Germans were able to give substitute goaler Eric Schamann his first good werk-out this year as he played the full second half in place of playing coach Phil Brooman.

They also worked in several players from their London and District Soccer Association First Division team, including Behavka, a halfback who played all but the final 15 minutes. Behavka's play improved steadily throughout, resulting in him scoring what proved to be the winning goal scored in the 12th minute of the second half.

Behavka took a pass from Ian McLean and broke through the right side and shot from 12 yards out. Traiss goaler Boda Haecker got a piece of the ball but it slipped through his hands and into the

goal.

McLean, who played for the
NSL Germans last year, has
been working himself into
shape with the First Division

club and showed some of the skill, although not the conditioning, which made him one of the top players on the club last year. He missed the preseason workouts as he was working at Windsor.

Harry Gauss, Peter Pochanke and Riny Van Boxtel, a regular from last year who has been working nights, also got some second-half action Tuesday night along with Brooman, who played on the field the final 15 minutes.

"I was surprised at the visiting team," said London team president Horst Ammonn. The London club had defeated another First Division team from Dusseldorf, 5-0, last year but Traisa played a much stronger game.

The three goalies, Schamann and Brooman for London and Haecker for Traisa all had a busy time of it as both teams went to the attack and played a hard brand of soccer.

Haecker had no chance on the penalty shot, brought about when a Traisa defender handed the ball in an attempt to stop Charlie Papp from getting it on a breakaway in the 30th minute of the first half. Brueninghaus took the shot and put the ball into the top left-hand side of the net as Haecker went to his right on the penalty shot.

Papp almost drew another penalty shot with three minutes left in the half when a Traisa player kicked him several times in the penalty area. Papp kicked back as the player was on the ground and referee John Thomason banished Papp from the game instead.

Traisa, however, in keeping with the spirit of the "friend-lv" match, allowed the Germans to play the second half with 11 players

with 11 players.

Lehr scored just a minute after the second half but Iszakovits scored nine minutes later on a good feed from Don Napier and Behavka three minutes after that to put the game out of reach.

Lehr scored again with 30 minutes left in the game after a Traisa corner kick but a power failure in the Cove Road area left the field without lights for over 15 minutes and the touring team was unable to mount any sustained attack after the game was restarted.





Germans back, better prepared

Experience is a vital quality which London German Canadians naturally lacked last year, their first in the National Soccer League.

It showed in the first twothirds of the season but the club learned quickly, winning six of its last 10 games and finishing in 10th place in the 14-team league with an 8-14-4, won-lost-tied record.

This year the club, with its feet wetted, is ready for the deeper water of tough semiprofessional NSL.

The Germans open the season May 9 against Hamilton Homer at Hamilton and, while sticking with basically the same team which brought them success last fall, the team hasn't been idle over the winter.

Team manager Max Gauss earlier this week signed a new coach—Phil Brooman—and has 12 players under contract —nine of whom were with the team at the end of last season.

Brooman, a 25-year-old native of London, England, will serve as a playing-coach.

He played goal at one time with Brentford in the English Football Association Third Division. Brentford is now in the fourth division. He also played with several teams in England's Southern Division finishing with Canterbury where he was an assistant coach.

A graduate of the FA coaching school at Crystal Palace, Brooman was a high school sports instructor before coming to Canada last month. Besides soccer, Brooman also

coached tennis, cricket and the rather North American game of basketball.

Brooman says that he has watched and enjoyed ice hockey but admits he has a hard time standing on skates.

Brooman will be of particular value to the Germans for the early part of the season as regular netminder Stan Puskas will be lost for over a month of the regular season with a broken leg.

Puskas, who came to the Germans from Czechoslovakia 1½ years ago, does play hockey and he suffered the leg injury in an industrial hockey game last week.

When Puskas, who had impressed Brooman before the injury, returns to the lineup, the German coach can also take a turn on the forward line, if necessary.

One of the German players who hasn't let up since last fall is diminutive Carlos Iszakovits, the team's leading scorer with 12 goals. He has been working out all winter "in snow up to my hips" and is one of nine regulars to return to date.

Heinz Bruninghaus, who came to the club after the season started last year but finished one goal behind Iszakovits, is also back. Bruninghaus, a jack-of-all trades on the soccer field, just returned from a winter of playing soccer in Germany.

Harry De Vlugt, a speedy right winger picked up late in the year is also back with the team. He played soccer the past winter in Holland.

Also signed on the forward line is Charlie Papp, who, like Puskas, underwent knee operations this past winter.

Gauss also has four players

back on his tough defensive unit which kept the Germans competitive in most of the early going last year.

Halbacks Franz Brudnjak, Don Napier and Rini Van Boxtel plus fullback Arno Wenneker have signed contracts with the team.

Team captain and halfback Ian McLean and fullback Hank Koenraads have not been able to make decisions about playing this year because of work commitments.

Gauss has also signed two new players with NSL experience.

Bill Nepotiuk, a 24-year-old Western student, was captain of fourth-place Toronto Ukraina last year. A fullback, Nepotiuk also played with Western's division-winning Mustangs last year.

Walter De Wilde, a 30-yearold physiotherapist, who played last year with Toronto Hungaria, can play any spot on the forward line.

Gauss has also been in contact with Tibor Magyar, whose magical footwork helped to mature the German forward line last year. Magyar played in Europe this past winter and is now in London, England.












London German Canadians will open only their fourth season in the National Soccer League when they meet Toronto Italia Wednesday night at their Cove Road playing field.

But only four players signed this year started with the Germans in their venture into non-amateur soccer back in 1969.

Three of them are expected to start against the Italia team, which is a new entry this season along with Hamilton Italo-Canadians.

Charlie Papp, who just turned 26 Sunday, has been playing senior soccer in the London area since he was 14 and is the only player from here to make a national soccer team. He played for Canada in the 1968 playdowns for the 1970 World Cup competition.

He will play an inside forward position and has the added duty of team captain which could be useful in helping Papp control his fierce desire to win. It will be even more helpful if the new responsibility can help him channel that drive to his team-mates.

Papp is the only London-born player on the German team and one of only three Canadians.

Charles Iszakovits, the youngest player at 18 when he started with the Germans four years ago, has started to score, as team manager Max Gauss figured he would when he gained the necessary experience. Born in Rumania, Iszakovits has played in the London and District or the NSL since coming to Canada in 1966. He will probably play a link position.

The third player, goalie Stan Puskas, came here from Czechoslovakia in 1968 and played some spectacular games for the Germans in their initial year in the NSL. He had operations on both knees in 1970 then broke his ankle just prior to the start of that season and never got back into action. He had a good trial with Montreal Olympics of the North American Soccer League last spring but after a misunderstanding about who owned his professional rights, he returned to the Germans.

Arnold Wenneker, a 29-year-old fullback and one of the mainstays on the German defence its first two years, is attending the University of Guelph and will probably get spot duty until he plays himself back into shape.

Fullback Hank Koenraads, back after a year working at Sudbury, and halfback Riny Van Boxtel are also charter members who are working out with the team but who haven't signed yet.

Also returning to action from last year will be Jim Berry, Milan Behavka, Harry Gauss and Stuart MacDonald.

Berry, a speedy fullback from British Columbia and another Canadian-born player, was on the 1968 national team with Papp who steered him to the Germans when Berry's company transfered him to the Hamilton area last year.

Behavka, a 22-year-old linkman from Czechoslovakia, joined the NSL team midway through the 1970 season and blossomed out into one of the club's top players last year.

Gauss, the youngest player on the team at 19, is the son of the team manager and has been handling most of the club paperwork as team secretary in his father's absence. Max Gauss has spent most of the winter in Sudbury where his construction company is building apartments. Harry, a winger, was born in West Germany but has learned all his soccer in Canada since coming here in 1958.

MacDonald, a 23-year-old inside forward, led the Germans in scoring last year with 14 goals. Gauss wanted him in 1969 when he arrived here from Scotland but MacDonald was able to get a better job in Ottawa and played there instead. He transferred here mid-way through the 1970 season.

They are Italians John Compostella, Mario
Pizzuti and Lino Carinci, Terrance Johnson,
from Trinidad, Bill Nepotiuk, who played
here in 1970, and Ron Misurka, who played
with the Western Mustangs and is the only
other Canadian-born player on the squad.

Compostella, a 30-year-old fullback, played for Toronto First Portuguese last year and has been with NSL teams for over a decade. He also wore Canada's colors last year in the first round of the Olympic Games soccer playdowns.

Pizzuti, a centre half, and Carinci, a 23year-old linkman, both played for Sudbury City last year but when Sudbury was given a leave-of-absence this season, they were declared free agents for one year. Both veterans will become City property again if Sudbury returns next season. The 25-year-old Johnson played for Trini-

The 25-year-old Johnson played for Trinidad's national team in 1969 and in New York in 1970. He played for George Brown College in Scarborough where the Germans spotted him. He is a quick left winger whom one team member compares to Harry De Vlugt, the lightning-quick right winger who was a sparkplug on the 1970 Germans before moving back to Holland. Nepotiuk, a West German of Ukrainian de-

Nepotiuk, a West German of Ukraiman descent, has played his soccer with Toronto Ukraina teams, including their NSL squad since 1969. He played part of the 1970 season for the Germans while taking post graduate work at Western. The 25-year-old halfbackfullback was one of London's steadiest players in the '70 season.

The 24-year-old Misurka played for Ukrania in 1970 but came into contact with the Germans while playing at Western where he was a standout player.

he was a standout player.

The Germans are also negotiating the release of forward Lutz Wolanski from Toronto Olympia and expect to see the return of Reinhardt Schubert, a tall winger who played in here late in 1970 before going back to West Germany where he is reported playing First Amateur soccer.

ing First Amateur soccer.

Wednesday's game, only one of two the Germans won't be playing at home on Friday nights, starts at 8:30. They will play Ottawa at the Cove Saturday, July 8 while Toronto Hungaria may play its home match with London either at the Cove Wednesday, June 14 or a Saturday or Sunday match at the Hungarian Club at Nilestown.

Milan finds London to his soccer liking

When Milan Behavka left Czechoslovakia in the fall of 1968, he didn't land in London, Canada just by chance.

Behavka came here because he had heard London was much like his own hometown of Brno, a manufacturing town of about 300,000 in the heart of an agricultural district.

The slim, quiet 21-year-old hasn't regretted the decision and London German Canadians of the National Soccer League have been more than happy about it.

Behavka scored his first league goal of the season Friday night as the Germans downed Kitchener Concordia Kickers 4-1 before 675 spectators at Cove Road Field.

Milan likes to score goals but he didn't want to place too much importance on that one.

"It didn't mean much. It just made the score 4-1," said Behavka, who also scored Tuesday night as the Germans lost 2-1 in an NSL Cup game to Toronto Hellas.

But the goal was a well-executed play and was typical of Behavka's play of late with the Germans.

"Milan_never showed what he had here," said Germans' manager Max Gauss. "He has always played his best soccer on the road. But he is getting more confidence playing before the home crowd."

Behavka plays the centre field spot along with Tibor Magyar in the London 4-2-4 system and he likes it better than the inside forward position he played as a First Division junior in Brno.

"You get more chances to handle the ball but you still get a chance to score," said Behayka He played it perfectly on his goal as he pushed the ball through to Stuart McDonald who fed it back to him. Behavka then broke to Kitchener goalie Sandy MacLachlan's left side and lobbed an easy shot into the net in the 29th

minute of the second half.

The goal made up for an earlier save by MacLachlan on a rocket point-blank shot by Behavka. The Kitchener goalie also came up with numerous other good stops as London outplayed the Kickers by a wide margin.

Derek Floyd and Carlos Iszakovits scored first-half goals for the Germans off passes from Charlie Papp then Papp drilled one in from 20 yards out early in the second half before Ron Corrall counted for Kitchener in the 18th minute of the second period.

THE 1980s

The new decade showed much promise for the senior program. The youth program would eventually die out. Many of the older players transferred to the GCFC men's program and many of the younger players left the organization after the London & District Minor Soccer League established city boundaries. The effort to recruit new players within the set boundaries was futile and the youth program ceased to operate.

The GCFC was hoping to build on their 1979 Ontario Cup journey. The influx of young and new talented players, would allow the GCFC the ability to remain in the First Division, build strong supporting teams and strive to maintain a high caliber of soccer. The 'A' and 'B' teams were able to be strong contenders in their respective Divisions in the London and District Soccer League. 1980 was a highlight year. In May the GCFC and Selects played an exhibition match against Forfar Athletic a team that played in a top flight division in Scotland. Following this

the GCFC, for the first time in it's history was able tour Germany and play a number of exhibiton games against West German teams that had once played at Cove Road field. Teams such as SV Traisa 1911, SV Weingarten, Marburg, Düsseldorf SV, FC Cologne and to end the tour, Polizei SV Bremen. This adventure will forever be in the hearts and minds of those that went. To cap off 1980 the GCFC took one more trip, to sunny California. The intent was to play a number of exhibition matches against local German-American Clubs but alas this did not come to fruition, but a wonderful vacation was had by all.

Pests survive shootout, edge Germans for title

LONDON, Ont. — Jeff Jenkins was hoping it wouldn't come down to him.

"I wanted to go last," he said of his spot in the shootout that decided Monday's London and District Soccer League First Division playoff final. "I figured maybe I wouldn't have to shoot at all."

Jenkins figured wrong but his foot did everything right in lifting St. Thomas Pests to a hard-fought 3-2 victory over London German-Canadians at Cove Road Field. The win allowed St. Thomas to claim the Forest City Challenge Cup as First Division playoff champs.

The match was tied 1-1 after regulation time and 2-2 following two 15-minute overtime periods. That meant a nerve-wracking round of penalty kicks, and the Pests took it down to the last shot.

Dave Grassie scored first for the Germans, but Richard Mommersteeg and then Mark Pineau put St. Thomas ahead. Meanwhile, St. Thomas keeper Bill Poirier made three straight diving stops to put the Pests on the brink of victory.

But Chris Loucks and Eddie Plaumann couldn't beat Germans' keeper Mike Weber and, when John Barton solved Poirier, it put all the heat on Jenkins. He didn't wilt.

"I wasn't thinking about anything else," he said later. "I was just concentrating on the shot."

"I couldn't have made it any closer. I put it in off the post."

The shootout experience was something new for Jenkins and most of the Pests, who — outside of three players — range in age from 19-21 years.

"I've never been in a situation where it's come down to penalty kicks in a championship game. It's a new experience for most of us guys.

"It's sure a lot of pressure."

The appearance of the Germans in the final was somewhat of a surprise. They finished in fourth place in the regular season with a 5-4-9 record, but upset second-place Woodstock Stallions in the semifinals Saturday.

St. Thomas won its semifinal match with Delhi Athletics 3-1 at Athletic Park the same day. Jenkins admitted the Pests were almost certain they'd be playing Woodstock in the final, and maybe weren't as ready for the Germans as they should have

TOOK LIGHTLY

"We figured Woodstock would kill those guys (Germans) — we took them kind of lightly today. We'd beaten them 5-0 at the beginning of the year and again since then, so maybe we weren't as up as we should have been."

Coach Lino Lattanzio admitted later "they looked nervous out there — but I suppose it's understandable, they're young."

"We were getting whipped but when we had to, we showed the way we can play."

Loucks got the Pests off to a quick start in the 12th minute. His corner kick was blocked just inside the 18yard box but Loucks pounced on the rebound and drove a high shot to the left corner over a leaping Weber.

The Germans began taking the play away from the Pests shortly after and forced strongly in the second half. St. Thomas didn't have a shot on goal in the final 45 minutes, although there were a few near misses.

Pressure applied by the Germans paid off in the 34th minute of the second half, as Jim McConnell left-footed a shot just past Poirier to equalize.

The teams went to overtime and the Germans gained their first lead eight minutes in, with Martin Steven-

Over the winter of 1980-81 the GCFC had serious issues with their parent, the German Canadian Club. Failing to come to any resolution almost the entire GCFC organization ceased their affiliation to the German Canadian Club and left with all the players that helped build the FC over the past decade. The only players that remained were Juergen Belle and Bruce Kennedy. Juergen Belle inherited the FC Presidents position, which he holds to this present day and had the unenviable task of rebuilding the FC from the ground up. With the financial help of the German Canadian Club and an aggressive recruitment campaign by all members within the German Canadian Club the GCFC were able to field only one team for the 1981 campaign. The next few years were nothing but struggle and frustration with the GCFC not even being able to produce a formidable contender. The 'A' team wallowed at the bottom of their division and was eventually relegated to Division 2 after the 1983 season.

That all changed in 1984 when Max Gauss, who still had strong ties to the GCFC, negotiated and recruited a very promising talented group of 17-18 year olds to play under the GCFC banner. This team was entered into the local LDYSL in the U19 Division consisting of only 4 teams, German Canadians, London Portuguese, Wallaceburg, Delaware and Sarnia. In 1985 this team moved up to the U21 Division and consisted primarily of Laurier and Westminster High School players. Through these mid-80's these young players played enthusiastically in there division and made an immense contribution by helping the senior teams at the GCFC to achieve considerable accolades from 1985 to 1989. Some of these players, Dave Hook, Paul Hook, George Rawski and Russ Donlan, can be seen to this day toiling as GCFC "Masters" in the local 35 + League.



The 1985 season ended with the 'A' team promoted back to Division 1, having the 2nd least goals against, Division 2 Play-off Champions, Division 2 Cup Winners, Nick Grayson receiving the Golden Boot (18 goals), Shawn Rotteau (Golden Boot runner-up) and Ralph Belle named June "player of the month". THE 1990s

This decade started with much promise. The German Canadians 'A' team was in the Premier Division for the first time. The task at hand was to compete at a level that would allow the GCFC to stay in the Premier Division all the while recruiting players that would maintain this level. This was very difficult to do. There was no depth in the GCFC with supporting teams in the lower divisions and a non-existent youth program. This resulted in a very difficult 1990 season with the German Canadians finishing just out of the relegation zone. Without this strong development program in place the German Canadians were eventually relegated back to Division 1 in 1991. This did not sit well with many of the 'A' team players and added to this, a perception that the parent, German Canadian Club, was non supportive resulted in a mass exodus from the GCFC. This decimation caused the 'A'

team to struggle immensely and they were finally relegated to Division 2 in 1994. The struggle continued from 1995 to 1997. With a re-alignment of the Western Ontario Soccer League, and poor performance, the German Canadians were relegated once more, to Division 3, for the 1998 season. 1998 was another successful year with the German Canadians finishing 2nd in their division, winning the Division 3 West play-off final and Asif Isic, the oldest player on the team at 40+, capturing the Golden Boot Award. The league again restructured and this enabled the German Canadian to win a spot in Division 2 for the 1999 season. The German Canadians ended the decade with a respectable 4th place finish and a very positive outlook for the upcoming new Millennium.

The GCFC "Masters" program throughout the decade thrived and competed well in the Middlesex Masters Soccer League. The highlight of the decade for the "old boys" was winning the League Championship in 1990.

THE NEW MILLENIUM

The demand for quality soccer venues in the City of London increased to epidemic proportion. Cove Road Field being one of the premier fields in London and being extensively used, with a thirty year old flood lights required a major refurbishment. The German Canadian Club, under the Presidency of Ed Henke, negotiated a large grant from the City of London which allowed the installation of new floodlights increasing the illumination of the field many times over. This resulted in the Cove Road Field having the highest number of requests for its use. It was home to many amateur games, top flight games including television broadcasts.

From 2000 – 2004 the German Canadians competed well in Division 2 of the Western Ontario Soccer League, but did not benefit at the year end awards presentations. In the latter part of this period internal team strife created an atmosphere that resulted in many players not enjoying their participation with the team. Eventually a number of the veterans who were the foundation of the team decided to leave. 2004 was the last time that a German Canadian 'A' team competed in the open men's League. After six months of aggressive campaigning, recruitment drive and searching for players with the talent to compete at this level the GCFC had to terminate the competitive program.

The "Masters" program continued to thrive and grow. In 2001 a German Canadians 'B' team was entered in the MMSL followed by a 'C' team in 2006 and a 'D' team in 2008.

Since 2003, an atmosphere of revitalization and growth has happened. There has been the return of youth teams to the club at the competitive level, the introduction and


expansion of a women's program, and significant growth in the men's masters program. Soccer is alive and thriving at the German Canadian Football Club.

The youth program now consists of three teams; two boy's u10 teams and a boy's u12 team. A mini field has been built to allow all our teams to play home games at the German Canadian Club and created a sense of belonging within the organization. There is a solid group of dedicated coaches and volunteers who look to build the future of the club through our youth.

The women's program has enjoyed much success in its rapid growth. The inaugural team in 2006 won the league and the cup and was promoted to the first division. The team continued its success by finishing second in the first division earning a spot in the premier division of the league. The club now boasts a women's premier team and two second division teams and a master's team who are all getting good results.

The men's program has grown to four teams in the Middlesex Masters Soccer League which is unparalleled by any other club in the region. The success and enjoyment of playing for the German Canadian FC continues to attract new players to our organization.

We are proud to be a part of the 75 year history of the club and see many good things on the road ahead!

Builder/Founder Legend Markus "Max" Gauss

Max Gauss didn't gain the reputation as the Godfather of London soccer by accident. He earned the title the hard way as a driving force behind the development of the sport and in particular, of the London City professional team.

Max has been the only president that City has ever known assuming the position when the club was first formed on Valentine's Day in 1973.

Born in Filipovo in the former country of Yugoslavia on December 23, 1929, he learned his soccer in his hometown of Stuttgart, Germany where he was a prominent amateur defender. He came to Canada in 1958 landing in Montreal with a brief stop in Winnipeg before settling in London where he established a successful masonry construction business.

His love affair with London soccer began in 1958-59 as manager-coach of the German Canadians team in the old London and District Soccer League which is now known as the Western Ontario Soccer League. Max moved on to become cofounder and GM of the German Canadians entry in the National Soccer League in 1969 and continued the position through 1972. In 1973 the club became London City, which today is the longest lasting professional soccer franchise in North America.

As a point of distinction, he is only one of two persons who have been a governor of the NSL, the Canadian National Soccer League, Canadian Professional Soccer League and the Canadian Soccer League of which London City is a current member.

Max is also responsible over the years for bringing some of the leading European teams to London for exhibition touring games. Included was an appearance by the famous Diego Maradona when he

was at the height of his career in 1996.

Son Harry is the current London City operator and GM but it was Max who is the catalyst behind the team's success. That the team is the oldest surviving professional club in North America is a tribute to Max's foresight and financial support.

Max was inducted into the Western Ontario Soccer League hall of fame in 2005. The London Sports Hall of Fame is proud to open its doors to

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Western Ontario Soccer League Hall Of Fame Salutes Herman Belle

When Hermann Belle came to London in 1956 one of his goals was to find a football club so he could play the sport he loved. When a mass exodus of German Canadian players occurred in this year Hermann immediately was one of the players that stayed behind and was one of the driving forces to rebuild the German Canadian FC. In addition to rebuilding the FC he played competitively until 1963 in the original London and District Soccer Association. During his active playing years he was on the League Championship team of 1961, 62 and 63 including the capture of the prestigious City Cup in 1962. He also was involved in helping the Germans Canadians win the hard fought for International Cup three times in five years. After sustaining a serious knee injury which prevented him from playing from 1963 to 1967, Hermann continued to contribute to the successes of German Canadian FC by becoming an executive member of the Soccer council, and he was its President for many years. During these years he was one of the principals in building a youth system within the GCFC that was eventually represented in every age division, something that no other club in London was able to do at this time. The German Canadian FC also established a men's "B" team to compete in Division 2. During this entire period Hermann administered, was both player and coach with the men's "B" team, coach of the men's "A" team, as well as coach for the pee-wee and bantam teams in the youth program. The list of accomplishments under Hermann Belle's leadership is

lengthy: Division 2 Champions in 1964 and 1966, City Cup winner 1965, Sinosic and Schaeffer Cups 1966, Cresswell Cup 1973, Division 2 Champions 1972, and Division 3 Champions in both 1974 and 1977.

In 1980 Hermann passed all administrative responsibilities of the GCFC to a new generation. Hermann




continually remained involved in the activities of the German Canadians as a mentor and advisor of the coaching staff of the men's teams.

In his golden years you will quite probably see Hermann at Cove Road field. Whether it is at a CSL, Masters, Women's or youth game he will always find time to watch and talk about his favorite game, "football."

For his many contributions to the game of "football" in the City of London as a player, coach, and administrator for one of the longest operating Football Clubs in London Hermann Belle was inducted in 2006 into the Western Ontario Soccer League Hall of Fame.
